BEST PRACTICES OF THE INSTITUTION

Best Practice - I

1. Title of the Practice

e- Internal assessment through effective use of Multiple Choice Question Bank

2. Objectives of the Practice

- To increase the element of objectivity and consistency in marking.
- To ensure validity, reliability and fairness in conduct of internal assessment tests and marking.
- To enable assessment of large classes effectively.
- To train the students to appear for online competitive exams with confidence.

3. The Context

After the grant of Autonomy the College has thoroughly overhauled its evaluation system and introduced Continuous Evaluation System. As part of this, 30% of the total marks in each paper have been allotted for the Internal Component. The College conducts two Internal Assessment Tests for 15 marks each in every paper and awards marks to the students by calculating the average of the marks scored in the two tests. It had been observed that the attendance patterns of the students were not healthy especially in the Arts and Commerce streams. So, after the grant of Autonomy, the College has allotted 05% of the Internal Component for the Attendance. In order to improve the communication skills and presentation skills of the students, 05% of the Internal Component has been allocated for Classroom Seminars by the Students. Another 05% marks has been allocated for Assignment work to improve the writing skills of the students. The two Internal Assessment Tests are aimed at assessing the different cognitive skills of the students.

Over the years, the college has provided increased access to education. To sustain the quality of education, it is imperative to have an objective, consistent and reliable assessment tool. Assessment through Multiple choice questions is one such reliable method. To make the formative assessment question paper more objective, it is imperative that a quality question bank is available in all subjects. Further, most of the eligibility tests and competitive examinations at the State/National/International levels are conducted as online examinations.

Hence it is the need of the hour to prepare the students for online exams. This necessitated the creation of the computerized question bank for Formative e-assessment for internal assessment tests. A novel evaluation practice / tool has been designed to test students' skill. Automatic generation of questions according to blueprint avoids bias in the selection of questions. Mark processing in this context is automatic and avoids human errors.

4. The Practice

Preparation of Faculty

At the beginning of every academic year the newly recruited faculty is introduced to the novel practice during the orientation. In addition, faculty members were given additional training by experts in the area of question bank preparation. Techniques in designing the stem of the question and distracters of the multiple choice questions are practiced in the workshop.

Creation of Question Bank

The Internal Assessment tests have exclusively Multiple Choice Questions (MCQ's) at three hierarchical cognitive levels of learning namely knowledge, understanding and higher ability. A blue print is framed at the departmental level based on the various units of the syllabus and ensuring that the question paper has 40% of the questions on knowledge level, 30% on understanding level and 40% on higher ability questions. The bank has six fold of the number of questions in the blue print covering all the units of the syllabus. Subject experts and senior teachers validate the questions available in Question Bank.

Custom made software is employed for the purpose of question bank creation, updation and generation. Faculty members replenish the questions which have been already used for the previous semester examination. So that the Question Bank always has six fold.

e-generation of MCQs

On the day of the Assessment tests, questions are generated automatically as and when the students log in. The questions are generated according to the blue print. Students get to see on the screen each of the 30 questions separately. In the allotted time of 30 minutes students can change their answers any number of times. However, once the allotted time is over the students cannot change or mark answers. The students can immediately check their score and also the answers for questions they couldn't mark correctly. This system enables strict confidentiality and complete objectivity in the assessment process of the students.

Conduct of e-assessment Examination

Hands on training and mock exams are also conducted to the I year UG students prior to the final examination. On the day of the examination the questions are uploaded in the server and shared in a number of PC's according to the class strength so that all the students of the particular class are able to take the assessment simultaneously. The questions are jumbled so that no two students sitting next to each other will have the same question in their desktop screen. The examination duration (in minutes) for the e-assessment is equal to the number of questions plus another five minutes.

Scoring & Report Generation

Once the students take up the e- internal assessment the answers given by them are stored in the server and the scoring is done automatically by the software. The system generates reports as soon as the test is completed which saves the precious time of the faculty spent on manual scoring of the answer scripts.

5. Evidence of Success

- The e-assessment has enabled the institution to economize the usage of a large amount of paper every semester.
- Malpractice is minimized since each student gets a different set of questions.
- As soon as the examination is over, the reports are auto generated which gives the scores of all students who took the examination.
- The Question Bank of all courses consists of a pool of validated Multiple Choice Questions comprising all the units of syllabus at the 3 cognitive levels of learning knowledge, understanding and higher ability serve as a valuable asset to the institution.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

- The mismatch between the number of PC's available and number examinees.
- Difficulty in the allotment of time slots for different batches of students as all the students have to take the test in a particular paper on a single day.

- The distracters are not jumbled. The software employed for conducting the examination can be fine-tuned to jumble not only the questions but also the distracters in each question.
- The same computing facility is used as laboratories for conducting e-assessment as well. Hands on training and mock exams are conducted for the I UG students sometimes impede the conduct of laboratory exercises for other students.

7. Notes - Reliability, Security and Data Integrity Measures

- The existing QB is always six fold of the required number or even more.
- The system is versatile and can also work on other kind of technology with the little modification and quite flexible to install and maintain.
- Soft copy and back up of the QB is stored and is kept under the control of coordinator of CIT.
- Additional copy question bank is stored in examination office under the custody of Controller of Examinations.
- Students are supplied with the hard copies of the Question Bank well in advance.
- This is a novel evaluation practice / tool designed to test student's skill. Automatic generation of question according to blueprint avoids bias in the selection of questions. Mark processing in this context is automatic and avoids human errors.

Best Practice – II

1. Title of the Practice

INFORAYS – The Student-Managed College Magazine

2. Objectives of the Practice

- To improve the writing skills of the students.
- To give an opportunity to the students for creative expression of their ideas, thoughts and feelings.
- To develop Research Culture in the students.
- To provide opportunities to the students to play leadership roles
- To train the students to work as teams.

3. The Context

After the grant of Autonomy, the College has initiated several quality enhancement and sustenance measures. As part of this, the college has started publishing a monthly magazine managed by an Editorial Board comprised of only the students of the college. It had been observed that the students had very little scope for creative expression of their ideas, thoughts and feelings. Further, it had been observed that the reading and writing habits of the students were on the wane. So, the College has taken a decision to start a monthly magazine called INFORAYS to be totally managed by the students. The students and also the staff were asked articles to the magazine. The received articles were to be assessed by the editorial board and published on the basis of their merit. The articles were on topics relevant to the respective domains of the students and staff, topics of national and international importance. Students were also asked to write Articles on Environmental Issues.

4. The Practice

Preparation of Students and Faculty

Soon after the idea of student managed magazine took genesis, the faculty members of all the departments have been asked to orient their students towards the new practice. In pursuance of the instructions received, they have conducted separate sessions for the students to enlighten them about need to contribute articles to the magazine. For the interested students, the English Department conducted special classes to hone their writing skills. The students who were picked for the Editorial Board were given special training in Editing and other related areas by the experts.

Logistics

The Management of the college came forward to provide the logistical and financial support required to run the magazine smoothly and successfully. A separate room, with all the necessary Equipment like computers, printers, scanners etc was allotted to the Editorial Team. A team of senior faculty members was asked to provide the necessary support to the team. A local printing press has been asked to collect the manuscripts from the Editorial Team and submit the printed copies every month on time. A team of students from the Management Department has been assigned with the job of collecting advertisements for the Magazine. Another group of students from the Computer Science Department has been given the job of assisting the Editorial Board in designing the cover pages of the magazine.

Selection and Publication of Articles

Students are asked to submit their articles to the Editorial Board before the 15th of every month. Then the articles are scrutinized by the Board after which they are sent to the English Department for proof reading. The articles on certain topics are sent to the respective departments for their opinion on their print worthiness. The magazine also publishes news and photos related major events conducted in the college. Finally, the manuscripts are sent to the printer for publication and timely submission.

5. Evidence of Success

- The publication of the monthly Magazine has given the students a platform to express their ideas, thoughts and feelings creatively.
- Since the introduction of this practice, the number of students visiting the College Library has gone up considerably. It is ample evidence that the students have started reading books other than the prescribed books.
- A large number of students are contributing articles, reports and also tidbits to the magazine which goes to show that the students have started to write on their own.
- The students who wish to contribute articles and reports to the Magazine are frequently seeking the help of the faculty members, especially of the English Department. This has resulted in the increased interaction between the student community and the teaching community.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

- Initially, it was difficult to get enough number of articles for the Magazine.
- Since it was a new experience to the students to work on the Editorial Board, they couldn't properly edit the items and submit them on time for publication.

- Even now, the Institution is finding it difficult to attract enough number of advertisements for the Magazine as a result of which it still requires financial assistance from the Management.
- It has been observed that sometimes the articles received from the students are not up to the required quality yet they find way into the Magazine for want of alternatives.
- The Editorial Board was given a separate room with necessary furniture and equipment such as a computer, printer, scanner, latest video camera etc. However, the Magazine is currently being run mainly with the financial assistance from the Management. The Magazine is planning to invite articles from the students and faculty of other reputed institutions too for improving the quality of its content. This requires additional funds from an external agency.
